## ISAIAH I

## CHAPTERS 1 - 39

NOTE: For clarification, we suggest using the Amplified Bible or another translation. Use the King James Version to answer the questions.

The prophets of Israel were the great preachers of their time. Many people think of the prophets as spiritual men of the past who disappeared. But God still has great prophets today, boldly speaking out against the sins and evils of our generation and pointing toward future events. To be a prophet or to prophesy does not necessarily indicate a ministry concerned only with future events. Much of the prophet's ministry was to point out the sins and compromises in the "church", or Israel.

Understanding the historical setting of Isaiah's ministry is paramount to understanding his message. Although Israel was outwardly prospering, inwardly the nation was becoming corrupt, lawless, and apostate. The northern ten tribes, called Israel, had revolted and separated from the southern kingdom, Judah, primarily to whom Isaiah preached. The spiritual decay taking place within the nation was temporarily halted by revivals and godly rulers such as Hezekiah. But in general, Judah had begun a downhill slide which was ultimately to end in captivity.

Because the Lord is longsufferd merciful, men deceive themselves to think that perhaps God will not bring forth judgment and ament for sin. But sin will be judged. The purpose of God sending men like Isaiah, Amos, Jeremid others was to warn that if the people did not repent, judgment was coming. The immediate tent for Israel was about 30 years away when the Assyrians would come to destroy the northern orn. The immediate judgment for Judah, the southern kingdom, was about 100 years away when the onians would be used by God to destroy and carry His people away into captivity.  But the Lord knew that Israel would not fully repent and serve Him through these judgments; fore the prophet many times transcends the coming judgment and looks forward into the great tent of the Tribulation. Jeremiah calls the Tribulation "the time of Jacob's trouble."
